Memoir Notes

• The Fence

The incident reported here took place at 608 38th Street, Long Beach, California where my parents had rented a house about 1959. The vine growing on the fence is Purple Passionfruit (*Passiflora edulis*). The butterfly is the Gulf Fritillary (Agraulis vanilae).

• The Rock

The incident reported here took place in Santa Ana Canyon, Orange County, California in about 1953. The snake under the rock is a Ring Necked Snake (*Diadophis amabilis*).

• The Snail's Burden

The snails in the souk are Edible Snails (*Otala tingitana*). The snails in our backyard at 3402 Snowden Ave., Lakewood, California are Garden Snails (*Cornu aspersum*). Hans Lind (1976, Causal and functional organization of the mating behaviour sequence in Helix pomatia (Pulmonata, Gastropoda), Behaviour 59:162-202) gives a detailed account of pulmonate snail mating behavior. Wikipedia gives a good summary of research on the love dart of pulmonated snails (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Love_dart).

• The Ditch

"The Ditch" runs parallel to Los Coyotes Diagonal in Lakewood, California. The ditch now has vertical sides and a bottom of poured concrete. The animals I encountered there about 1954-1956 were Alligator Lizards (*Elgaria multicarinata*), Fence Lizards (*Sceloporus occidentalis*), Western Toads (*Bufo boreas*), and Pacific Chorus Frogs (*Pseudacris regilla*).

• The Boy Professor

The search for bugs takes place in the vicinity of our house (3402 Snowden Ave., Lakewood, California) about 1954. My grandparent's property (The Ranch) was in Santa Ana Canyon, Orange County, California near the town of Olive. The current address of the ranch house is 351 S Henning Way, Anaheim, CA 92807. The reptiles and amphibians I saw there as a child (1945-55) are Western Skinks (*Eumeces skiltonianus*), Fence Lizards (*Sceloporus occidentalis*), Alligator Lizards (*Elgaria multicarinata*), Gopher Snakes (*Pituophis annectans*), Ring Necked Snake (*Diadophis amabilis*), Pacific Chorus Frogs (*Pseudacris regilla*), Toads (*Bufo boreas* or *californicus*), Slender Salamanders (*Batrachoseps major*). When I visited the property about 1970, I saw Whiptail Lizards (*Cnemidophorus hyprythrus*) in a sandy ravine on the west side of the property. In the 1940s my grandparents killed Red

Rattlesnakes (*Crotalus ruber*) as well as Gray Foxes on their property. Deer and coyotes were sometimes seen.

• Mr. Peepers

The incident occurred at our house on Snowden Avenue about 1954. The predator at the Ranch was thought to be a coyote at the time, but it might have been a Gray Fox, which were also known to be there.

• A Fork in the Road

The tryout happened in Lakewood, California while we lived at Snowden Ave. The grove of trees (eucalyptus) where I hunted lizards and grasshoppers during Little League games was located in an old agricultural field. Our uncle Buck (Charles Henry Arnold) coached Pony League teams in Long Beach, taking one team to a World Championship.

• A Mother's Pride

My mother's friend is Barbara Stiles, who lived on Greenwood Avenue. The picture of me with Liz and my brother Tim was taken when I was about 18, not 14, as in the story.

• A Grandfather's Love

The Civil War pistol probably belonged to Jesse's grandfather, Hopson Arnold, who served in the Union Army.

• An Aunt's Concern

My Aunt Margaret is Margaret Louise Monty (1917-2001).

• First Friend

Tim Clarke lived at Tyler Ave., El Monte. I lived at 2219 El Capitan Ave., Arcadia. The tortoises in Tim's backyard are Desert Tortoises (*Gopherus agassizii*).

The various reptiles and amphibians are Prairie Rattlesnakes (Crotalus viridis helleri), Pseudacris cadaverina, Rana boylii, Lampropeltis getulus, Pituophis melanoleucus, Masticophis lateralis, Sceloporus occidentalis, Uta stansburiana, Cnemidophorus tigris, Salvadora hexalepis, Lampropeltis zonata, Lichanura roseofusca, Ensatina eschscholtzii, Aneides lugubris, Batrachoseps gabrieli, and Phrynosoma coronatum. The owls were Great Horned Owls (Bubo virginianus)

Our German teacher at Arcadia High School, and sponsor of the German Club, was Isolde Syben, PhD. The Mountain Kingsnake is *Lampropeltis zonata*. The rattlesnake is *Crotalus viridis helleri*.

• The Little Pond

The birds that visited the pond were the Common Egret and Mallard Ducks. The toads were *Bufo boreas*.

The field trip with Katie Briggs was sometime in the 1980s.
